



2019 NEW YORK STATE EXAMS

Scaling Excellence

Once again, Success Academy scholars topped the charts of New York State schools: Number 1 in the state! As the state’s seventh-largest school district,* Success enrolls 17,000 students across 45 schools, educating about one in 60 public school students in New York City. On this year’s state exams, our test-takers surpassed their more affluent peers across the state, with 90% passing English Language Arts and 99% passing math.


*Success Academy is not technically a school district; it's a charter management organization that operates public charter schools. Demographic data and enrollment totals reflect the overall K–12 student population for the most recent year available (2018–19 for SA and 2017–18 for other districts). Ranks are calculated based on the average passing rates for both ELA and math. For Success Academy, household income is based on the median family income for the U.S. Census tract of every test-taker. For other districts, household income reflects U.S. Census data on median income for families in the municipality.

NYC's Most Vulnerable Children


Too many of New York's most vulnerable children are not learning to read or do math. Children with disabilities, homeless students, and English language learners are being left behind in district schools. More than 155,000 children of color in grades 3–8 cannot read or do math. Failure at this scale is devastating for kids and communities. Success has shown that children across all subgroups can achieve at high levels, which drives parent demand for our schools — and fuels our dual mission: to build more world-class schools where children from all zip codes and socioeconomic groups can succeed and to change the public policies that prevent so many children from access to a life-changing education.

Math Pass Rates by Sub-Group


